

Cairo Highway Superintendent Bob Hempstead said he was glad to provide any and all resources he could for the effort.

"It's amazing," Hempstead said at noon time. "I can't believe how much garbage they have gotten already."

Hepstead said that when Walker first talked about organizing the cleanup, he got together with her to

talk about how his department could help.

"I told her I would be happy to provide her with whatever she needed," Hempstead said. "I gave her our garbage pickers and bags and on Monday we will pick it all up, weigh it all, to give her a total tally of what they picked up."

Walker said she also reached out to an art teacher at the high school who is having her students make posters that will be laminated and put up in the resorts and some of the more conspicuous places in town to try to try to raise awareness about littering.

"I called this, 'the first annual," Walker said, "and I spoke to [Cairo Legislator] Harry Lennon about writing grants and generating some money to put this together."

Walker said she would like to see this kind of effort extend throughout the other parts of town, but starting at home is a good start at that.

"I live in Round Top, the resorts are in Round Top," Walker said, "and I thought that the resort owners would certainly have it be in their best interest to have their guests arrive, in the summer, to a clean environment, as clean as we can make it."

Although Walker said it was obvious to her that the roads will be littered again before summer settles in, she is confident that her effort Saturday is one that marks the start of something.

"In the aftermath, this has been a total success," Walker said, "and the numbers will tell the real story. Everybody that came in, came in with positive feed back about the amount of trash they collected."

Earth Day cleanup nets 2,000 pounds of trash

CAIRO — Last weekend's Earth Day cleanup in Round Top generated almost 2,000 pounds of trash, it was reported Wednesday.

The Cairo Highway Department supplied almost 75 volunteers Saturday with orange bags and pickers, and later collected and weighed the trash.

Tires and metals were separated from the ordinary trash.

"When people do the right thing, it makes them feel good," organizer Gail Walker said about the event during the Cairo Town Board meeting Wednesday.

Cairo Town Supervisor Ted Banta thanked Walker for her effort in a letter.

"Your direction and service is a testament to the Town of Cairo," Banta wrote. "Once again, thank you for your service and commitment to our town."

Those who volunteered for the cleanup included local Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H and Cairo-Durham High School Interact Club members.

"Furthermore, I commend the volunteers who earnestly spent their Saturday to make the event a resounding success," Banta wrote.

"We want to thank all participants who helped make this possible with their contributions of labor and donations," said Linda Mascari, vice president of the Round Top Ladies Auxiliary.

The staging area for the cleanup was the Round Top firehouse; the fire department provided lunch for participants, while the Ladies Auxiliary supplied deserts as well as water bottles.

The area's resorts donated money to buy T-shirts, which were made by Mountain T-Shirts in Catskill. The National Bank of Coxsackie donated work gloves.

— Phil Jackson of Project Hope, a crisis counseling program offered by the Mental Health Association of Columbia-Greene Counties in collaboration with the New York state Office of Mental Health, addressed the town board about establishing a support group in Cairo for victims of Tropical Store Irene.
